Individuals driving past the CenterPlace entrance now see a new sign directing people to BCRC or the Transportation Center. BCRC’s portion of the sign is a digital bulletin board that announces meetings, events, weather conditions, and other notifications.

BCRC has also been very successful in obtaining numerous grants to make several updates to the building. Improvements include...

An updated sprinkler system, new work lights, ice guards (to stop snow and ice from becoming a hazard), completion of a beautiful accessible restroom, and updating the heating and cooling system.

Preparations are also being made to relocate some of BCRC’s business ventures. The new embroidery business will be located in an area of the work center, while plans for BCRC’s Records Management business have been drawn up. A conference room on the second floor will be transformed into a highly secure document scanning facility. Additional offices will also be constructed for BCRC staff.

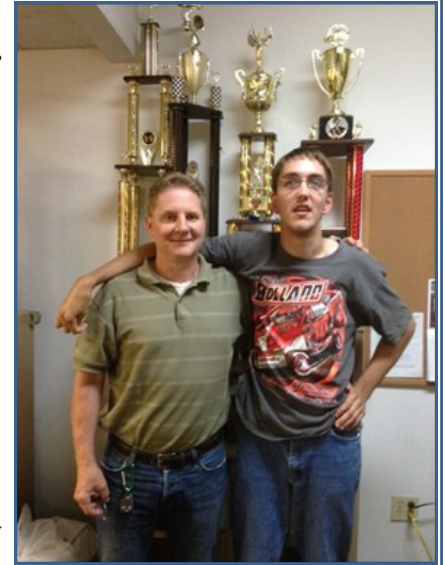
“Do you like that guy?” she asked, motioning toward his shirt.

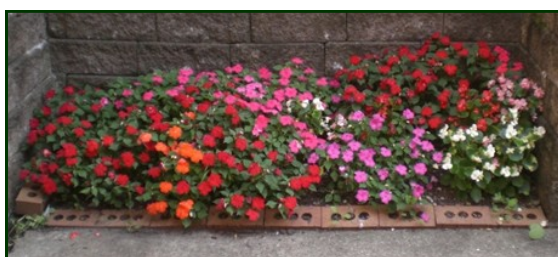
“Onna” Retires

School Students Learn Gardening Skills



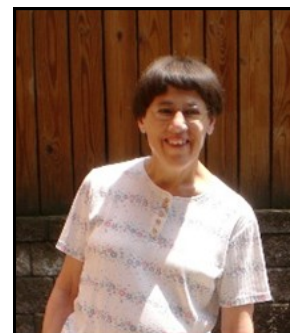
