BCRC School to Work Opens Career Café

Recent grants from Baden Walmart and Constellation Energy have enabled BCRC's School to Work (STW) program to open their new Career Café.

This student led initiative, inspired by the success of several local Beaver County high schools, incorporates both life skills and vocational skills. Students bake food items to sell, design café menus, take customer orders, serve food and beverage items, and work the cash register. They develop vocational, life, and math skills.

Students "earn" career cash while attending volunteer and assessment sites in the community. They can then use their career cash to purchase items within the Career Café.

School to Work's long term goal is to open the Career Café to WIN Services' clients, BCRC staff, and possibly the parents of current STW students as a way to fund the Career Café program in the future.

Students recently hosted a meeting of the local Beaver County Chamber of Commerce at the Career Café. They gained valuable experience planning and serving the public at this event.



BCRC raised \$960 in the annual Friends Helping Friends sale at Boscov's this October; the most money raised since BCRC has participated in the event.

Each year the staff raise money for our Client Christmas Gift Fund, which provides each participant with a special Christmas gift from staff along with a gift from the agency, itself.

BCRC has participated in the event since Boscov's opened at the Beaver Valley Mall in 2006. We sell the passes for \$5 each and the bearer of the pass receives 25% off most of their purchases for an entire day. Boscov's offers great sales that day even before the additional savings, and they open for extended hours.

BCRC sold a record breaking amount of shopping passes this year! Our employees purchased 105 passes totaling \$525. Boscov's also let us set up a table to sell passes to customers walking into the store. Executive Assistant Sue Leiper started the morning off strong and then several WIN participants and staff members worked the table, selling an additional \$435 worth of shopping passes!

We are so thankful for Boscov's continued dedication to non-profit organizations in Beaver County!
